

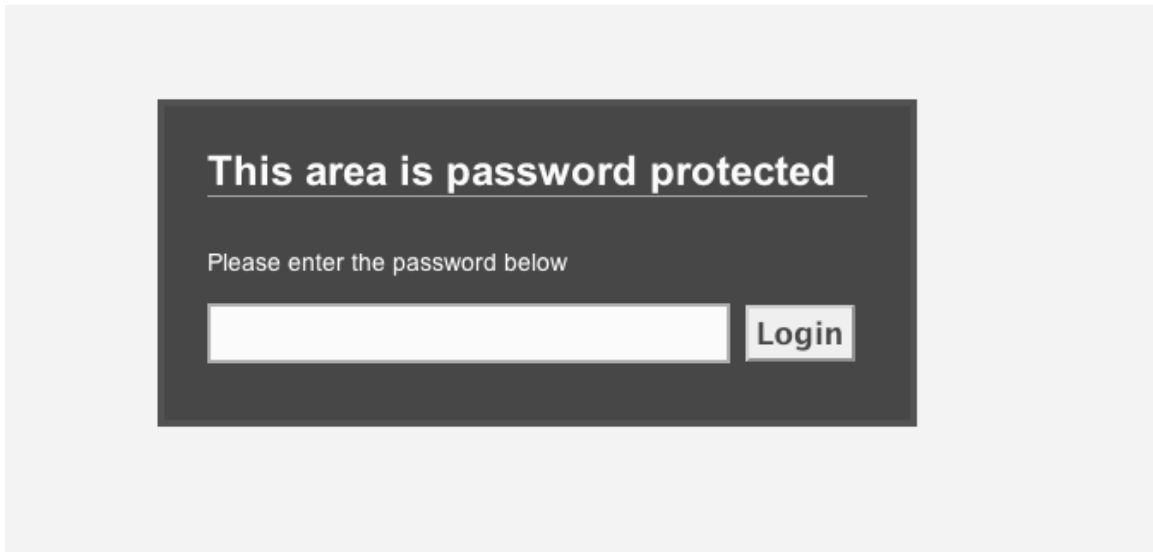
An Engaged Citizenry: Using Primary Sources in Civics and Government

Online Class Help Guide

Logging in

The address for the online classroom is <http://engagedcitizenry.weebly.com/>. The first time you visit the site, this is what you will see:



The online classroom is password protected, so everything we do on the site will remain private.

Site password: TPS

The password is case-sensitive; be sure to use all caps for the letters “TPS.”

The Online Classroom

The Online Classroom has four pages: the Home Page, Assignments, Message Boards, and Resources. The links for these pages are across the top of every page on the site. When you are on a page, the name of that page will be highlighted at the top of the page.

Home Page

Each month, the content on the home page will change; it will be used as a place to update you on what to expect in the current month.

Assignments

Each month, the Library of Congress self-paced modules and the webinar links will be posted here. On the right side of the page is a column with one heading: Archives. If you want to see all the postings in a given month, click on the month under Archives.

Message Boards

The Message Boards are where online class discussion will take place. This is where you'll get to know each other, talk about your lesson plans and the webinars/self-paced modules, and ask the professors (and each other!) questions.

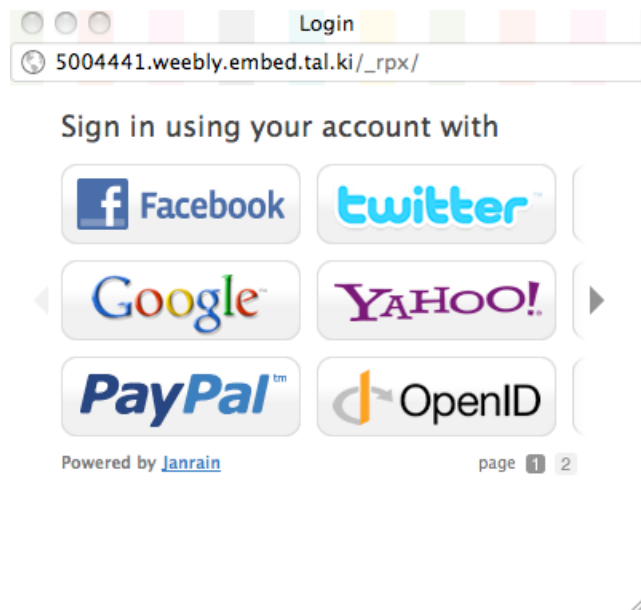
You must log in to the Message Boards before you can post anything. Here's how:

1. Click on Message Boards at the top of the page. This is what you'll see:



2. Click on either place indicated with an arrow.

3. If you have an existing social media account, such as Facebook, Twitter, Google, Yahoo, PayPal, and many others, please click on that account and use it to access the Message Boards. This is the easiest and most seamless way to access the Boards.



4. If you do not have an existing account at any of the listed options, you'll need to create a Google account. Here's how:
 - a. Go to <http://www.google.com>
 - b. Click on "sign in"



- c. Click on “create an account for free” or “create an account now.”

Using the Message Boards

Communicating on the Message Board

Writing a message on the Message Board is called "posting." You can do two things on a Message Board: Reply to an existing post, or Start a Topic.

Replying to a Post:

When someone posts a question, you will be replying to his or her post. Here's how:

1. Click on the topic.

To start a new topic on a Board:

2. Give your post a title.
3. Write your message in the Post box.
4. Where it says “Category,” under the Post box, choose from the drop-down list the specific Message Board where you want your post to go.
5. If you want to be notified by email anytime there’s a new post, keep the “subscribe” box checked; if you don’t, uncheck it.
6. Click Post Topic.

Keys to successful posting

- Don't just say, "I agree with what she said." Think instead about how you can add something new to the conversation, or ask a question that will deepen it.
- If you disagree with someone, do so constructively, by focusing on the topic and not on the person.
- No profanity, personal attacks, insults, etc.

Resources

The last page in the Online Classroom is the Resources page, where all of the readings, links, videos, and anything else used in class will be listed. This will be a useful list of everything you've read in the course. We will try to make all readings available electronically if we can!
